## **Two Works from Same Author** (Create separate entry for each in works cited)

 $Signal\ Phrase \rightarrow Jones\ notes...$  ("Title of Article"). {Author in sentence, title in citation}.

*Citation* → (Jones, "Title of Article" 29). {Rarer use of both author and title in citation}.

# **MLA 8<sup>th</sup> Edition In-Text Citations**

**Basic Format** for in-text citation (author page) (Smith 25).

If **no author**, citation must list title of work ("XYZ Article" 33) abbreviate title to noun phrase.

If **no page** #, citation just lists author or title of work (Smith) ("XYZ Article").

**Citation must match** whatever leads off the corresponding Works Cited entry.

**Missing elements** are simply omitted. Do not use placeholders as in n.d., n. pag.

**Basic Format for Signal Phrase** According to Smith, "Lakeland is a wonderful college" (25).

**Two or More Works in One Citation** Separate sources with semi-colon  $\rightarrow$  (Cy and Jones 25; White et al. 33).

**Indirect Source (Source Quoted in another Source)** (qtd. in Smith and Jones 25).

**Direct quotations** (author's exact words)  $\rightarrow$  Use quotation marks. Citation required and needs page number.

**Summaries & paraphrases** → No quotation marks. Citation required but doesn't need page number.

**Block** indent quotation if more than four lines in your paper, or more than three lines of poetry.

## **Other Helpful Tips**

**Hanging Indent** *shortcut in Word* → CTRL-T, *shortcut on Mac*→ COMMAND-T

**Italicize Titles of Long Works:** books, magazines, journals, newspapers, anthologies, plays, long poems, web sites, databases, movies, music albums, television/radio programs, visual art, photos, and electronic games **Use Quotation Marks for Titles of Short Works:** articles, short poems/stories, essays, songs, TV episodes
