

Structure of an Essay

<u>Introduction Paragraph</u>: Starts general with a hook statement to grab readers' attention. Gradually introduces essay topic and narrows to a specific <u>thesis</u> statement as the last sentence. If writing about literature, use this paragraph to introduce names of the work(s) and author(s). **Thesis** statement states the main idea or claim of the essay and is the intro's **last sentence**.



Body Paragraphs: Three or more body paragraphs provide examples to support **thesis** statement. If writing about literature, use quotations/facts as detailed examples. All body paragraphs start with a topic sentence which clearly states the <u>main idea of the paragraph</u>.



<u>Conclusion Paragraph:</u> Starts specific and then gets general. First sentence is a reworded restatement of your **thesis.** Middle sentences summarize main **body paragraph** points (think of this as one sentence summaries of each body paragraph). Last sentence concludes essay and makes reader ponder more about your topic. <u>Do not introduce any new information</u> in your conclusion that wasn't mentioned in your essay!
